The following petition, by Mr. Roy Glass, was referred to Professor Bill with power to act:

"To the Faculty of the University of Oregon
Owing to the incompleteness of my mathematical credits in Portland University in account of the lack of grades and the difficulty in adjusting my mathematical credits in Portland and Pacific Universities with the requirements

of the University of Oregon, I hereby
petition you to grant me on my
mathematical work at Portland
and Pacific Universities fifteen and
one half credits; which is the 799
mathematical requirement in
the classical course according to
the catalogue of 1900-1901 of the
University of Oregon.

In Portland University I went
with the class in trigonometry
to some where in spherical trigono-
metry when I left school on account
of sickness. When I returned I was
obliged to drop trigonometry in order
to catch up in my other studies
before examinations.

At Pacific University I completed
trigonometry under Professor Ferrin,
with Prof. Fletcher as assistant,
with a grade of medium, while carry-
ing twenty-seven hours of work.

I completed as extra, according to
catalogue 1900-1901, Wentworth's College
Algebra with a grade according to
credentials.
