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## Student Unions:

6 The current program (version 7.2) was presented and revised below (to version 8.2) based upon discussion. Fifteen total Student Unions can be accommodated, with three different modules ( 5 each) of 300, 225 and 150 net square feet. There was discussion about keeping all Student Unions the same size. EMU Board preference would be to keep them all the same size for easy management (total area would be required to be the same); but Student Union representatives preference was to keep 3 different sizes. Decision: keep the program as is: 3 different sizes.

9. Scaled three-dimensional blocks to represent the program were also presented.
a. LGBTQA asked that their space be as open as possible, removing partitions from small workroom and having workstations with the capability to be easily moved to allow maximum flexibility of their space.
b. They prefer to hold large meetings in this space. Student workstations that can fold down or tuck into walls during large meetings. Workstations that are just tables, not computer stations, giant crafting tables hung from walls with power. Not study oriented space in office. Seating and standing levels.
c. L-shaped staff station - sit behind desk but still see room or lead meetings from that position.
