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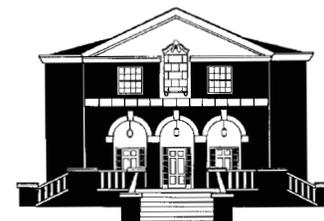

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PROGRAM NOTES

From There to Here

Aaron Barnhart

From There to Here is a four-part work that explores several facets of time and experience. Each part offers a new perspective on the passage of time and the interaction that humans share with one another.

Part 1: *Connected*

The first section, entitled *Connected*, adopts the viewpoint of the lone observer that is detached and disillusioned. *Connected* explores the feelings of loneliness and foreboding that result from a lack of spiritual and social connection

Part 2: *Between Two Worlds*

The second piece, entitled *Between Two Worlds*, explores the idea that no person is an island. Every person's life experiences are inextricable tied to those of others. Humans cannot simply hope for connections, they must create them. The two worlds referred to in the title are those derived from my own experience, and those derived from others' experiences. The work is created in real-time as Heidi Diaz's movement generates musical material through the use of infrared sensors.

Part 3: *Pause*

The third section, entitled *Pause*, musically and metaphorically explores the desire to slow time and prolong certain moments. The work is built slowly by looping phrases, one at a time. The video is manipulated in real-time by the music as it is created. The choreography and movement featured in the video are by Heidi Diaz.

Part 4: *From There to Here*

From There to Here embodies many of the broad ideas and ideals I wish to convey. this final section is a song of hope that declares that love is the most important aspect of our journey through life.

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
