PSY 410G

This course is an introduction to topics and problems of mutual relevance to psychology and law. Hence, it will be characterized more by breadth than by depth.

The class will meet three times a week for lectures, demonstrations, and discussions. The reading material will not be reviewed during the lectures, but it will often serve as the basis for discussion — so please try to read it before coming to class (but don't skip class just because you have been negligent in your reading).

If you are taking this class for graduate credit you must 1) take the final, and 2) write a term paper on a topic of your choice which is of mutual interest to psychology and the law. The topic of the paper must be approved by me before November 3, 1987.

If you are taking the course for undergraduate credit you must either 1) take the midterm and the final or 2) take the final and write a term paper on a topic of your choice which is of mutual interest to psychology and the law. The topic of the paper must be approved by me before November 3, 1987. You must decide which option (1 or 2 above) you will take by November 3, 1987.

The examinations will include both essay questions and short-answer / multiple-choice questions.

Course Syllabus

An outline of the course is presented below. It is not written in stone, but we will try not to depart from it too dramatically.

I will be assuming that you know something about psychology, research methods, and the legal system. If you feel the need to review any of these, do so during the first part of the term when the reading load is lighter. A good book on the criminal justice system, Kaplan and Skolnick's <u>Criminal Justice</u> is on reserve at the library.
