This course is designed to provide students with a review of different theories of personality and methods of personality assessment. The primary focus is on so -called "normal" personality, however, personality problems, psychopathology, and treatment of personality disorders will also be included. It should be noted that personality and psychopathology are each broad areas which easily could constitute the focus for an entire course (or two or three). Therefore, this course cannot provide comprehensive study of both fields, but rather an overview of each.
