This course is concerned primarily with the study of individuals interacting in groups of two or more. Many of the topics covered in this course have been studied by anthropologists, cognitive scientists, management theorists, and sociologists as well as by psychologists; hence, we will draw on the literatures of several different disciplines. However, psychological research will be the basis for this course.

Course Requirements

This is a graduate/advanced undergraduate course. You will be expected to be able to read and to write at that level. If you feel uncomfortable with either task, do not take this course. You should also be familiar with the basic statistics and research methods taught in Psychology 302 and 303.

<u>Undergraduates</u>

During the first part of the course we will occasionally spend a class period doing a mini-experiment and discussing the results. The experiment and the associated lecture/discussion and readings will be covered in a quiz given during the next class period. In addition, there will be a midterm and a cumulative final examination consisting of multiple choice questions and short answer/essay questions. The short answer/essay questions will be taken from a larger set of study questions which will be distributed about one week before the midterm and final examinations.

<u>Grading</u>: Each quiz will be worth 10 points. The midterm examination will be worth 25 points and the final will be worth 45 points - for a total of 100 points. Grades will be allocated according to the following scheme:

<u>Graduates</u>

You will be required to write a term paper on a subject in the field of group behavior (broadly defined) and you will be required to take the final examination described above. You must arrange to meet with me to discuss the topic of your term paper prior to 10/14/93. A formal proposal/outline for your paper must be turned in to me by 10/28/93. We will arrange a time after that date to discuss your proposal. The paper itself is due at the final examination.

<u>Grading</u>: The term paper and the final are each worth 50% of the course grade.
