# Psy 495 History of Psychology

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This course is designed to provide the majors in psychology, or those with substantial interest in the field with an analysis of the current scene in scientific psychology from the perspective of its history. We will also deal with the use of psychological or psychoanalytic concepts in history (psychohistory, historimetrics) and biography (psychobiography, citation analysis, lineage analysis). We will trace prescientific thinking about mind and behavior, the early development of scientific concepts in psychology and the major schools of thought. We will spend several weeks dealing with the history of the subfields that comprise current psychology. We will analyze the major themes of current psychology and attempt to extrapolate from them some of the developments to be expected over the next couple of decades.

All students will be asked to employ one or more of the historical techniques outlined at the start of the course in developing a paper that will place the work of a current psychologist in its historical perspective. The prerequisite for the field is 12 upper division hours in psychology, but this could be waived in the case of majors in other fields with work in history, philosophy, science or other relevant approaches.

Graduate students who take Psychology 595 must plan to meet one extra hour per week with the instructor. Please leave Wed at 4PM for this meeting (although we might not meet each week or might arrange other times).

#### PAPER ASSIGNMENT

The major assignment of the course is to develop a historical paper. The paper should take the form of a treatment of a major psychological figure or of a major historical theme.

If you choose to take a person you may select from those discussed in Bolles textbook in any of a number of autobiographies (e.g. Skinner or Simon) or from the Forty Studies textbook or from any of the many surveys of influential psychological figures. The paper may be biographical in form such as the Elms study of B.F.Skinner or it may involve the use of quantitative methods such as citation analysis to gage the influences on or influence of the person chosen.

A quite different approach to history is to trace a major concept developed in the field. Often this involves the metaphors such as those discussed in the book <u>Metaphors in the History of Psychology</u>. An excellent example of this kind of history is "<u>The History of Life</u>" by Jacob.
