## **GRADING**

<u>The Homework</u> is just to keep you on track and prepare you for the tests and quizzes it is graded 1-10 points (5 points automatic for timeliness and neatness/readability). 2 points off for each day late. Please hand in photocopies (double-sided on recycled paper if possible). Take the practice tests on your own but do not hand them in.

<u>The Ouizzes</u> are short exams which will be given during the last third of the class time. Prepare for these by reviewing homework, taking the self-tests in the text and thinking about the essay questions in the text and study guide.

<u>The Exams</u>: There will be one midterm and a final. In general, the tests to measure your knowledge of the material presented in class with an emphasis on both the concepts and the experimental findings which support these concepts. The final will be half devoted to recent material and half cumulative.

<u>The Term Paper</u> is meant to provide you a chance to learn detailed information, provide knowledgeable summaries, and show insight into specific problems or avenues of inquiry relevant to biopsychology. The paper is described in detail on the next page.

Extra Credit - Can be gained in two ways (48 points maximum):

- 1) Participate as a research subject in Psychology Department experiments, 6 points each, maximum of 3. To receive credit, hand in your experimenter credit slip stapled to a one page description of the experimental goals and procedures.
- 2) Write additional reviews of original research papers in biopsychology, 10 points each possible, maximum of 3. Reviews are mini-papers that are graded according to the term paper criteria. Reviews should not exceed 5 pages, include a copy of the original paper, secondary sources are allowed.

Term Paper

<u>Term Paper evaluation:</u> Write a short paper (6-10 pages) detailing a sub-discipline of biopsychology by studying one of the references provided in the text (see pg. 479). Pick a cool topic, find the original paper, consider how this work is a study of how body influences the mind, find ancillary papers as necessary, and write a summary. Candidate references must be 6 pages or longer and you can read and report one or two related papers in your short summary of the topic and the techniques used to study the topic.

An appropriate paper should include the following structural elements:

- \* An introduction which clearly summarizes the issue at hand.
- \* Example(s) of the real-world importance of your issue.
- \* An overview of the research strategies being used to address the question/disorder/...
- \* An analysis section wherein you summarize the findings.
- Papers will be typed, double-spaced, 12pt font, and contain complete sentences with very few typos or misspellings.
- Papers will be scored according to the following sub-categories:

Presentation	15
Structure and Flow	15
Coverage of the topic	20
Understanding of the material	50
Total	100

(Divide all scores by 10 for breakdown of extra credit reviews grading)
