Evaluation: Several sources could be used in deriving your course grade: (1) the mandatory final exam; (2) the optional midterms (3) the optional quiz/discussion groups; (4) the mandatory critical thinking paper; and (5) the optional course project.

- (1) The final exam will cover the ENTIRE course and will be aimed at assessing your comprehension of the ideas presented in the lectures, films, and text. Date: Tuesday, June 10 at 3:15 p.m.
- (2) The optional midterms will be offered on Friday, April 25 and Friday, May 16. Since these are optional, NO MAKE-UPS will be given.
- (3) Optional weekly quiz/discussion groups will meet on Wednesday at 11:00 and 1:00 and Thursdays at 1:00 (choose one) beginning Week #3. Sign-up sheets will be available Friday April 4 for those who elect to participate in this option. Weekly quizzes will be given in these groups and the points will be cumulative. You will be graded on the quality of your group participation (60%) and on the cumulative quiz points (40%). One person will act as group facilitator and will meet with the instructor and TA each Thursday from 2:00-2:50 to keep the groups coordinated, clarify expectations, report quiz scores, and give the instructor feedback about class presentations. Group facilitators will begin meeting on Thursday April 10 in Room 139 Straub. There will be NO MAKE-UPS for missed quizzes and after the second group meeting, this option becomes a commitment. NOTE: Do not elect the group discussion/quiz option unless you are confident you can be PRESENT and ACTIVE at every group meeting and can be CURRENT in your reading.
- (4) The mandatory Critical Thinking paper (APA style) requires that you integrate at least three recent scientific journal articles (1996-1997) or current information from the web in a paper responding to one of the following topics:
- The Status of Multiple Personality Disorder as a Legal Defense

- The Difference Between Asperger's Disorder and High Functioning Autism
- Treatment of Antisocial Personality Disorder
- Etiologies of Transsexualism

- Cultural Variations in Obsessive Compulsive Disorder
- Recent Advances in the Treatment of Alzheimer's disease
- "Sudden Death" or "Voodoo Death" (not SIDS)
- Sexism (or any other bias) in the DSM-IV
- Cultural Factors in Social Phobia
- Evidence for "Preparedness" in Specific Phobias
- The Relationship Between Hypochondriasis and Histrionic (or any other) Personality Disorder
- The Relationship Between Cyclothymia (or Bipolar Disorder) and Creativity (or any other personality variable such as self-esteem or achievement)
- Factors in the Etiology of Body Dysmorphic Disorder

WEIGHTING OF SOURCES: If you do none of the optional activities, the mandatory final will constitute 80% of your grade and the mandatory Critical Thinking paper will constitute 20% of your grade. If you do the two optional midterms and the optional discussion/quiz group, the final will count 20% of your grade as will each of the midterms, the discussion/quiz group, and the mandatory Critical Thinking paper. Other weightings can easily be calculated by knowing that none of these activities, except the final and the optional course project, will count for more than 20% of your course grade. The optional course project will be graded separately on the basis of quality of the presentation and enhancement of the course content.

To receive GRADUATE credit for the course, you will need to write a series of "one minute papers" in addition to the above options. Using the last minute of class time, you will jot down your spontaneous responses to the following two questions: "What was the most important concept of personal learning in today's class?" and "What is still missing or still confusing to you about today's topic?" These papers will be handed in as you leave the classroom on each of the designated days.
