Psychology 609 Adult Assessment Practicum

Professor: Gordon C. Nagayama Hall

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Purpose of the Course: This course has two primary objectives. The first is to introduce students to psychological assessment as a process for solving important clinical problems. The second is to familiarize students with the administration, scoring, and interpretation of major assessment methods. Theory and research on assessment systems and methods in the areas of clinical interviews, objective personality assessment, projective personality assessment, and behavioral assessment will be reviewed and critiqued. The cultural relevance of assessment theories and research across diverse populations will also be addressed. The history of assessment, contemporary issues, and problems in assessment will be surveyed. Students will learn skills in administering and interpreting the SCID and MMPI-2.
