Course Description and Goals

Welcome to Psychological Assessment! This course examines the application of psychological methods to the study of the individual. We will examine the rationale of test construction and interpretation, problems in the prediction of human behavior, and various psychological assessment techniques. Understanding issues related to psychological testing and assessment will be critical for those of you going on to applied work in psychology (Clinical, I/O, Counseling, School Psych, etc.). In addition, learning these concepts will further hone your critical thinking skills and ability to be a wise consumer of psychological testing and assessment information.

Course Pre-Requisite

Successful completion of Psychology 303 (Research Methods) is a pre-requisite for this course. We will review some concepts as they apply to psychometrics, but I am assuming you have a working knowledge of methods and statistics and that this is not 'new' material for you.

Course Components and Requirements

Attendance at lectures is expected and will be an essential part of your success in this course. Students improve their learning when they stay current with the assigned reading and participate actively in discussing issues related to psychological assessment.

The lecture sessions will include review of selected textbook material, elaboration of some topics with information not provided in the text book, and unannounced in-class activities. You must be present to participate in the class activities—they cannot be made up for credit because you missed class. Quizzes will be used to assess your mastery of the lecture and reading material. There will be 4 quizzes in the course and the lowest grade will be dropped before calculating your course grade. If you miss a quiz for any reason, this will serve as the dropped quiz when calculating your course grade. Thus, make-up quizzes will not be scheduled. There will also be 4 homework assignments over the course of the quarter that are designed to help you learn the material and prepare for quizzes. Assignments are due in class on the scheduled due date. Late assignments will be penalized 2 pts. per day late (remember that each assignment is worth 10 pts. maximum).

Students enrolled in Psychology 570 will complete all the requirements described above and a 10-15 page APA style term paper on cultural issues in Psychological Assessment. The paper will be a review of major issues and related empirical research regarding psychological testing and assessment with diverse cultures. The paper is due in class on 11/29/05. Late papers will be penalized 10 pts. per day late.
