**Mission.** This course will introduce you to the scientific investigation of sensory and perceptual processes including vision, hearing, touch, taste and smell. Considerable attention will be devoted to understanding the neural mechanisms responsible for our perceptual experiences and how they change as a result of maturation, learning, injury and disease.

**Required Text**: At considerable savings to you, I have arranged for the publisher to prepare a custom textbook that includes only those chapters that will be assigned in this course. These chapters are taken from **Sensation and Perception**, 6<sup>th</sup> **Edition** by E.B. Goldstein. The hardcover version of the full book has been used on campus previously and you may be able to locate used copies.

**Additional Readings:** Electronic versions of all additional readings (both required and optional) will be available by download in portable document format (pdf) from the course website approximately 1 week in advance.

## **Grading & Course Policy**

**Eight Weekly Quizzes (25%):** At the start of class each Tues. you will complete a 15 min. quiz. This quiz will cover readings and lecture materials from the previous week. Given the large enrollment of the course the format will be limited to some combination of multiple choice, true or false, fill-in-the-blank, or diagramming or graphing. Your lowest quiz grade will be dropped automatically. Note that failure to take a quiz counts as a zero.

Three Examinations: (25% each): Exams will be composed of multiple choice, fill-in-the-blank, and short answer/essay questions. It may also be necessary to complete diagrams or graphs in some cases. Each exam will cover material dating back to the previous examination. No make-up exams will be given without evidence of a valid excuse, and the final cannot be taken earlier or later than the time listed in the University final exam schedule. If you know in advance that you cannot take all exams on the appointed dates (see the course schedule below), then please do not take this course. If unforeseen circumstances during the term prevent you from taking an exam, notify the instructor immediately.

**Graduate Credit:** In addition to completing the work required for Psychology 438, graduate students enrolled in 538 are required to complete an integrative review paper on a research topic approved by me. This topic must be approved no less than 1 month prior to the final examination (before May 6<sup>th</sup>). The paper will be due at the last class meeting
