## CONTEMPORARY ISSUES: CLINICAL AND PSYCHOPATHOLOGY MODULE

The purpose of this portion of the Contemporary Issues sequence is to address current research in the broad realm of Clinical Psychology. Crystal will provide an initial overview of the topics to be covered, of the course activities, and of student responsibilities. We will then cover several topics, drawing on local faculty expertise to cover diverse issues of interest in Clinical Psychology.

<u>Readings</u>. Readings will be provided in advance for each topic covered. All students are responsible for completing the core assigned readings (typically two or three articles) before the scheduled class, and for providing two discussion questions prior to class based on these readings. A copy of the questions should be e-mailed to the presenting professor by 9 a.m. of class day. Please be sure to CC a copy of your questions to Crystal as well as the presenting faculty member of the day.

<u>Discussion</u>. We hope to promote interesting and enlightening class discussion. The questions generated by students from the assigned readings will provide an initial focus for these discussions.

<u>Paper</u>. An additional requirement for this portion of the Issues sequence is a APA style final paper. The paper can concern any topic related to Clinical Psychology or psychopathology, as you choose. This activity can include a more traditional type of empirical review paper, or it could include a proposal for a research project. Approximately 10-12 pages of text are expected, with recent theoretical and empirical references included in the paper. Students experiencing difficulty in developing ideas for the paper assignment are strongly encouraged to consult with Crystal. The paper is due May 8<sup>th</sup>, 2006 (the beginning of the week following the last class period).

<u>Grading</u>. In arriving at an assigned grade for Spring Issues, general discussion and emailed questions will constitute 1/3 of the grade (30 pts. total—3 pts. per class meeting for 2 emailed topics/questions and attendance/participation in class). Emailed topics and questions must be <u>received</u> by 9 am in order to receive credit. The paper will constitute the remaining 2/3 of the final grade (60 pts.).
