COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course will focus on interdependence between mind and culture in various substantive domains such as cognition, motivation, emotion, and psychopathology.

CLASS FORMAT:

Classes will be a mixture of lecture, discussion, and/or group exercises. In order to be fully engaged and to participate in class, it is essential that you read and think about the material to be covered in lecture **before** you come to class. This will enhance your learning experience.

Please note: Lecture material is selective. We will not cover everything in the text in class but we expect you to be familiar with all the information in the textbook, irrespective of whether or not is covered in class. We will also introduce new material (not in the text) in class. Class meets Mondays and Wednesdays and your attendance is expected. Do make sure that the email address you actually use is the address listed on Blackboard, as important announcements will sometimes be sent to you through this email account. If it is not, please change it on Duckweb so that you don't miss any important announcements.

Exams: 60% of grade (30% midterm, 30% final)

The exams will be structured to assess your knowledge of the text, in-class films, lectures, and class discussions. There will be two examinations: a midterm and a final. Both exams will include a combination of multiple choice and short essays. Questions will cover material from **both** class lecture-discussions **and** assigned readings. The midterm will be based on the first portion of the course. The final will be based on the second portion of the course and will not be cumulative. Each examination will count for 30% of your final grade.

Research-Based Adaptation Paper: 40% of grade

The study of cultural psychology necessitates an understanding of the applicability of different theories/interventions across a range of diverse populations (i.e. religious, socioeconomic, ethnic, sexuality, gender). Please choose an empirically-based (i.e. research-based) intervention, assessment procedure, or technique, that is in current use as part of a service-delivery system (i.e. mental health, school). Your assignment is to adapt this intervention for a population (or subgroup) other than that for which it was originally intended for. Your rationale for the proposed adaptations must include: 1) a description of the

purpose of the original intervention/procedure/assessment (i.e. what research or theory is it based on, is it preventative or intervention related, what population was it originally employed on/created for, what issue is it meant to address), 2) a description of the new population for which it will be adapted and 3) a detailed account on how, specifically, you will adapt this intervention/assessment, with research and literature citations to support your decisions. This paper must be typed (computer printed), be 10 pages in length (double spaced, 1" margins, 12-point Times Roman, 11 point Arial or equivalent font), and follow APA Publication Manual, 5th edition guidelines. Paper topics must be approved by instructors. Selection of Topic: 10/22 (by week 5), Final Paper Due: Wed. 11/28 (in class)

Please note: Late assignments will NOT be accepted.
