Course Objectives

The study of cultural psychology addresses how culture has shaped our psychological experience, including our behavior, and our ways of thinking, feeling, and interacting with others. This will mean looking at how the human experience has changed over time, and how it varies across cultural contexts. I intend for you to come away with (1) specific knowledge about variations in some psychological phenomena across cultures, (2) an increased interest in and sensitivity to the role of culture in the human experience, and (3) ideas for how to approach and answer future questions about the role of the culture in psychology. Knowledge of cultural psychology should be useful to you in any future endeavor that involves interacting with or understanding people from different backgrounds. I hope you will ask questions and communicate your interests so that the material can be made as relevant to your current experiences and future goals as possible.

Graded Components

Reading Responses

These are intended to help you develop a connection to the subject matter by applying course concepts to your experience. Due the day before the lecture with which they are associated so that I can view your comments and questions prior to lecture.

Questions for reading responses will be posted on the 'Journal' section of Bb. These will start out asking you to draw on your experience and the course reading. However, some may require additional research and require you to go beyond the reading. This will be stated clearly in the assignment.

Each response should be about one page (single-spaced) of text with complete sentences, good grammar, and reasonable organization. Responses should be spell checked and carefully proofread. They should show thought and familiarity with the reading, Submit as a journal entry on Bb (under "Tools"). May not be turned in late unless with prior arrangement.

Participation

Points are based on attendance and participation in class discussions and activities.

Exams

Exams will mostly be multiple choices. Short answer and mini-essay questions may also be included. Essay questions will be drawn from the study guide available on blackboard. No dictionaries, thesauruses, calculators, or electronic devices can be used during exams, except translating dictionaries for those with English fluency issues, with permission.

Research Paper

Content

The research paper should deepen your understanding of cultural psychology by allowing you to explore a question of interest. You must cite at least four peer-reviewed journal articles that address your question (one book chapter is ok; no dissertation abstracts or popular press articles).

An A paper will:

- effectively identify the topic and why it is of interest.
- appropriately describe information relevant to the question from the sources.
- conclude with something along the lines of an answer to the question (a synthesis of the material).
- not just state that more research is needed, but will identify what additional research would best shed light on the question.

Style may be less formal than a 303 paper, but this will be graded for writing quality (grammar, sentence construction, coherence).

Format

No more than 5 pages (references can be on page 6).

Title page not needed -- put title, followed by your name, on first page at top.

Header, page #s, references, citations, page layout (double spacing, times new roman 12-point font, 1 inch margins) should all be APA format.

Basic outline

- I. The question or topic, why it is interesting and relevant, why we would want to know the answer.
- II. Perspective #1 how one researcher approached the question, and what they found.
- III. Perspective #2 how another group approached it or built on the first group, what they found.
- IV. Perspective #3 . . . (etc.)
- V. Summary and synthesis: compare and contrast the strengths and weaknesses of the different approaches and how they fit together. Do they build on each other or contradict each other? What was most compelling.
 - What you have taken away from your reading as an answer to your question, what you might still like to know, and how this addresses the need/relevance indentified at beginning.

Timeline

Week 4 (Thursday 4/26 before class): Propose topic by writing a clearly stated question on "Journal" in Blackboard. Consider noting an alternate idea. Proposals are subject to approval.

Week 6 (hard copy due in class Thursday 5/10). Paper Proposal.

- Write about half a page (double spaced) describing your question and why it is of interest to you and why it might be of interest to psychologists and/or the public.
- Identify at least four articles you plan to use. List them in APA reference format, and paste in abstracts.

Instructor may make alterations to your topic, or recommend different readings.

Week 10: Final Paper due 10 a.m. Tues., 6/5. Paper components lose 10% of points each day late.

Week 10: Presentation in class. Explain what you learned while writing your paper (5-10 minutes). State the question you sought to answer, what you learned about the topic, and something about the conclusion you came to. You may use Powerpoint slides if you wish – if so, email to instructor at least 12 hours prior to presentation.

Academic Integrity

Academic integrity will be taken seriously. Insuring the validity of grades requires that they reflect honest work and learning. **Cheating** is defined as providing or accepting information to or from another student on an exam or copying anyone's written work. Students caught cheating will be given an **F** for the course, and the student conduct coordinator will be informed. **Plagiarism** is putting your name on work or even ideas that are in any part not your own, where you have not fully identified the source from which you borrowed. In writing, always distinguish between your own ideas and those you have from others, and be sure to appropriately cite and credit.
