**Daily Quizzes:** One of the most effective study tactics is to constantly quiz yourself on the material that you are learning. These daily quizzes are intended to be a 'built-in' way for us to help you learn the material quickly and prepare you for the exams. They will consist of 3 questions total about the previous lecture and/or readings. You will be asked to write your answers down,

so please come prepared with **paper**, a writing utensil, and your UO ID number. Quizzes will be given every day except on the first day and exam days. Your lowest quiz will be dropped.

<u>iClicker</u> Occasionally we will present questions during lecture that you will be asked to answer using

<u>Participation:</u> your iClickers. Unlike the daily quizzes, only your participation counts- it doesn't matter whether you get these questions correct or incorrect, as long as you respond you will receive credit. Responding to 90% of the questions will equal 100% for this requirement.

# Take-homeThroughout the semester we will assign you different take-home assignments that will helpAssignments:you experience the concepts that we discuss in class in a real-world setting. To receive<br/>credit<br/>for these assignments you will need to either email a screenshot of completion, or write a<br/>short response. Each assignment should take less than an hour to complete.

Exams:There will be two in-class exams, each worth 30% of your grade. Please write the exam<br/>dates in your calendar, as there will be no makeup exams! The midterm will be on Friday,<br/>July 31<sup>st</sup>. The final will be on Friday, August 14<sup>th</sup> at 12:30PM. The midterm will cover<br/>material presented in the first half of the course; the final is cumulative and will cover the<br/>material presented throughout the whole course. Each exam will consist of 45-55 multiple<br/>choice questions and you will be allotted one hour for completion. These exams will be<br/>taken using Scantrons, so please come to class prepared with a No. 2 pencil, eraser, and<br/>your UO ID.

## **Research Credits**

**<u>Requirement:</u>** The research credit requirement is intended to give you first-hand experience with how psychological science is conducted outside of the classroom. 4.5 research credits are required for this course. There are two options for meeting this requirement.

### **Option One:** Participate in the Psychology & Linguistics Departments' Human Subject Pool. As a member

of

this study pool you will be able to sign up for studies listed on an online repository called Sona, available at <u>http://uopsych.sona-systems.com</u>.

- $\rightarrow$  You must be 18 or older to participate in human subjects research.
- → For participation to count towards the course requirement, the study that you sign up for must be <u>for credit</u> [not for pay, although there are paid studies available that we encourage you to sign up for if you're interested].
- → There are both in-lab and online studies available on Sona. However, <u>only a</u> <u>maximum of 2.5 credits can be completed online for this course's requirement.</u>
- → When participating in a study, <u>please be an active participant!</u> As you will see in this course, knowledge in our field heavily leans on the data collected from living,

result	breathing human beings. Please help maintain the integrity of our field by paying full attention during experiments and listening to the experimenter's instructions. Failure to show up to a timeslot that you signed up for, or being late for a timeslot, can
	in a 'no-show' on your Sona account. <b>If you accumulate two unexcused no-shows your</b> account will be locked and you will be unable to meet the course requirement using Option One.
<u>Option Two:</u>	<ul> <li>An important component of research ethics is that participation in studies must be entirely voluntary. Therefore, if for any reason you do not wish to participate in human subjects research we offer Alternative Assignment Sessions for you to meet the research requirement. The alternate assignment involves coming in to a classroom on campus and spending a 2 hour period writing responses to provided psychology articles [these sessions cannot be split into increments of less time]. If you are interested in signing up for an alternative assignment session send us an email. We will get back to you with the details of the next available session.</li> <li>→ If you are under 18 years old you must complete Option Two to meet the requirements for this course.</li> <li>→ There is an Option Two assignment for earning .5 credits, please email us for more details.</li> </ul>
<u>Credit Hours:</u> the	Each hour of participation, either in a study through the human subjects pool or spent in
	alternative assignment session, is worth one credit. Consequently, each half hour is worth .5 credit, and each 15 minutes is worth .25 credits. If you are eligible to complete Option One, you can fulfil the course requirement through any combination of Options. For example, one alternative assignment session + 2.5 hours worth of online studies= 4.5 credits.
<u>Requirement</u> will have	Failure to complete 4.5 research credits by the deadline of $\underline{11:59}$ PM, August $15^{\pm}$
<u>Incomplete:</u> our	two detrimental effects. First, 10% of your final grade will be a 0. Second, it is the policy of
	department to give you an Incomplete for the course until this requirement is met. If the requirement is not met within one year the Incomplete will be automatically converted into
an	<i>F</i> ; if the requirement is met before then, the Incomplete will convert into the letter grade earned in this course. <u>This deadline is firm</u> . Timeslots for experiments and the alternative assignment sessions fill up quickly, especially towards the end of the term. <u>You should plan ahead</u> to make sure that you can meet this requirement- the sooner done, the better!
