COURSE OBJECTIVES:

Welcome to Honors in Psychology! The purpose of this seminar is to a) provide information and support to assist you in undertaking and completing your honors thesis research and write-up, b) enhance your knowledge about what is involved in psychological research more generally, and c) enable you to engage in mutually supportive activities and discussions with other honors thesis students in Psychology. During Fall term in particular, we will focus on launching an honors project: Topics include literature searches, working with human subjects, as well as learning about and providing feedback on everyone's projects.

REQUIREMENTS FOR HONORS IN PSYCHOLOGY:

Complete and write-up an original research project (approved by 2 readers)

Complete Psych 412 (Applied Data Analysis)

Complete Psych 490/491/492 (Honors Seminar)

Give an oral presentation of thesis (in this class Spring term)

Present a poster on your honors research at the Celebration of Undergraduate Achievement (Spring)

REQUIREMENTS FOR PSYCHOLOGY 490:

- 1) Regular attendance and participation
- 2) Give a brief presentation on your research ideas
- 3) Turn in a 2-3 page research proposal (December 1)
