Fritz Gearhart joined the University of Oregon string faculty in 1998, teaching violin and chamber music and performing regularly with the Oregon String Quartet. Representing the third generation of professional musicians in his family, Gearhart received his master's degree and the prestigious Performer's Certificate from the Eastman School of Music, where he studied with Donald Weilerstein, Earlier studies were at the Hartt School of Music, where Gearhart worked with Charles Treger and members of the Emerson Quartet. Gearhart has performed in major concert halls around the country, including Alice Tully Hall, Carnegie Recital Hall, and the 92nd Street Y, as well as the Terrace Theater at the Kennedy Center. He has eight compact disc releases to his credit, the most recent which was released in April 2002, featuring music of African-American composer William Grant Still. Gearhart has been heard frequently on live broadcast performances and nationally syndicated programs, including "Performance Today" on National Public Radio.

ABOUT TONIGHT'S GUEST ARTIST

Chuck Owen is distinguished professor of jazz studies and as director of the University of South Florida's new Center for Jazz Composition, established and developed the Jazz Program at USF into one widely noted for its vigor, quality, and creativity. A noted composer, Owen serves as artistic director of Central Florida's Jazz Masterworks Series and Conductor of the "Jazz Surge," a collection of Florida's finest jazz and freelance musicians. The Surge's three CDs on Seabreeze Records have attracted the attention of musicians and critics worldwide, garnering glowing print reviews from the likes of Jazziz, Jazz Times, Jazz Educator's Journal, and Cadence magazines. They have also received strong radio airplay throughout the U.S. as well as in Europe, Australia, Taiwan, and Japan. Owen has written for the Netherlands' Metropole Orchestra, the Smithsonian Jazz Masterworks Orchestra, the Tonight Show, the Cincinnati Symphony, the Army Jazz Ambassadors and many others. He is the recipient of the 2001 ASCAP/IAJE commission in honor of Louis Armstrong as well as 16 ASCAP composer awards, two Florida Individual Artist Fellowships, and grants from the National Endowment for the Arts, the Hillsborough County Arts Council, the USF Publications and Research Councils. His published compositions number more than 50 and are performed frequently throughout the country. He has been the featured guest artist at colleges and jazz festivals throughout the country.

As the director of the USF Jazz Ensemble I for more than 22 years, he oversaw the production of ten recordings, backed dozens of guest artists, and led the ensemble in hundreds of performances including prestigious jazz festivals, conferences, and a 1990 invitation to the International Society of Music Educators' Conference in Helsinki, Finland. His devotion to teaching has been honored with a USF President's Award for Faculty Excellence and an Outstanding Undergraduate Teaching Award. In 2004, he began work on establishing the first research center devoted to the study and promulgation of jazz composition. As director of the Center, he is spearheading the first International Jazz Composers Symposium in March of 2006.

Owen has been named President-Elect of the International Association for Jazz Education. Previously he served IAJE as National Composition Chairman and as President of the Florida State Unit. He also holds a position on the Florida Chapter Board of the Recording Academy. He has authored several articles and reviewed new music for the Jazz Educators Journal. He is a graduate of California State University/ Northridge and the University of North Texas.
