ABOUT TONIGHT'S ARTIST

Barry Hannigan made his New York debut in Carnegie Recital Hall, and his European debut at the Edvard Munch Museum in Oslo. Norway. He has performed in Russia, England, Ireland, Norway, and New Zealand, and appeared as a guest artist on many American campuses, such as UCLA, Yale, Cornell, and the universities of Colorado, Illinois, Arizona State, and Texas. Hannigan has made festival and series performances at Real Art Ways in Hartford, the Syracuse New Music society, Wildflower Festival, and Roulette in New York City. He is on the roster of Pennsylvania Performing Arts on Tour. Dozens of his performances have been aired on National Public Radio-affiliated stations across the U.S. Hannigan is the recipient of many awards and prizes, including those from the Ford, Berlin, Surdna, and Presser Foundations. For three years he toured Pennsylvania, promoting work by living Pennsylvania composers, underwritten by grants from the Pennsylvanian Council on the Arts. He has also received a Solo Recitalist Grant from the National Endowment for the Arts award which recognizes the nation's outstanding recitalists. Hannigan has recorded for Opus One, SEAMUS, SCI, and Radio Telefis Eireann in Dublin, and recently released a CD for Black Canyon Records. Hannigan is also active as a concerto soloist, having performed Rachmaninoff's Paganini Variations with the Omaha Symphony and a chamber concerto written for him which he premiered with the Pittsburgh New Music Ensemble. Hannigan is a professor of music at Bucknell University in Lewisburg, PA, where he has received the highest university award for inspirational teaching. His students have earned degrees at schools such as Peabody, Eastman, and the New England Conservatory.
