A founding member of the Millar Brass Ensemble, Grose has recorded with the Chicago Symphony for London/Decca, and the Millar Brass Ensemble on the Crystal Records label. Mr. Grose has worked with such notable conductors as Sir George Solti, James Levine, Mistislav Rostropovich, Zdeněk Mácal, Giancarlo Guerrero, Carlos Kalmar, James DePriest, Jorge Mester, and John Williams. Professor Grose is a member of the Oregon Brass Quintet, the faculty brass ensemble at the University of Oregon. Since coming to UO, he has developed a website (www.TubaPeople.com) to highlight UO tuba-euphonium activities, and to offer educational/ pedagogical materials about the tuba and euphonium to interested students, educators, and enthusiasts. In addition, his YouTube channel, TubaPeopleTV, has garnered praise and accolades for its focus on the pedagogy of Arnold Jacobs. Mr. Grose was formerly an adjunct faculty member at Armstrong State University, Georgia Southern University, and was a faculty-artist at the Brevard Music Center in North Carolina from 1996-2007.
