ABOUT TONIGHT'S GUEST ARTIST

Jon Appleton (born Jon Howard Appleton, 1939 in Los Angeles, California) is a composer, author and the Arthur R. Virgin Professor of Music at Dartmouth College and Visiting Professor of Music at Stanford University. He was educated at Reed College, the University of Oregon and Columbia University. A composer of both instrumental and electro-acoustic music, Appleton is best known in the United States for the latter, much of it composed for the Synclavier, a digital performance instrument he helped to develop. His instrumental and choral music is best known in Russia, France and Japan. Appleton has been awarded Guggenheim, Fulbright, National Endowment for the Arts and American-Scandinavian Foundation fellowships. He has been a fellow at the Dibner Institute for the History of Science and

Technology and M.I.T., and a Visiting Professor at Keio University in Tokyo, Japan and teaches each year at the Theremin Center at the Moscow Conservatory of Music.

PROGRAM NOTES

Chef d'Oeuvre

Composed in 1967 at Dartmouth College this became the piece everybody has known of my music. Made from the recording of a Chef-Boy-Ar-Dee Pizza radio commercial, sung by the Andrews Sisters, it became the hallmark of a style I have worked with until the present day.

Study No. 1

In 1963 I composed my first piece of electronic music in a little studio Prof. Homer Keller and I put together in the basement of the Knight Library. I used one tape recorder, an oscillator and a filter borrowed from the physics department. This little short piece was presented on a student composers' recital. Then Dean Robert Trotter warned the audience that "we must be prepared for the terror of new music!"

Sashasonjon

Composed in 1981 for an instrument I helped invent called the Synclavier, this is a video of a part of the piece in which perform and then explain how the music was created and how the instrument worked. Sasha was my Russian step-father, a bass player with the NBC Symphony under Toscanini. He was largely responsible for my being a composer yet he had no understanding of electro-acoustic music. When I received my M.A. in composition from the University of Oregon in 1965, he urged me to enter the legal profession. He died in 1981 much happier about my life as a composer.

Oskuldens Dröm

Composed in 2006 in collaboration with Berlin DJ "Kunstler Treu," this is our most recent work. Our previous CD "Wunderbra!" was released three years ago on the Crippled Dick Hot Wax label and seems to have become a cult favorite.
