An award-winning poet, Chin codirects the master of fine arts program at San Diego State University. Her latest book, published in September 2009 by W.W. Norton, is *Revenge of the Mooncake Vixen*, a collection of poetic tales.

Nominated for Best New American Voices and the Discovered Voices awards, Bushnell is an Oregon State University instructor who holds M.F.A. degrees from the universities of Oregon and Idaho. Kuipers, whose poems have been nominated three times for the Pushcart Prize, is a 2007 M.F.A. graduate of the UO Creative Writing Program who became a Stegner Fellow at Stanford University in fall 2009.

Mark Jarman

The Centennial Professor of English at Vanderbilt University in Nashville, Tennessee, Jarman is an award-winning poet and essayist whose collection of poetry, *Questions for Ecclesiastes*, won the 1998 Lenore Marshall Prize and was a finalist for the National Book Critics Circle Award.
