A NOTE FROM LUCY SHELTON

Why unaccompanied song? A singer's career includes glorious moments in front of the public, but far more time is spent in solitude - in studying scores, and developing skills. It is therefore of utmost importance to find enjoyment and satisfaction in these hours of practice (or composing) and to treasure the process of preparing for a concert. By choosing unaccompanied song for this residency, I have given the singers the opportunity to sing songs just for and BY themselves (what we do in "practice" time). The fear of vulnerability ("nothing to hang on to" or "where do the pitches come from") is soon replaced by an excitement in discovering solutions. The singer becomes totally self-reliant, replacing fear with commitment. I imagine it to be equally vulnerable for a composer to write a single vocal line with no obvious vertical harmony, though it might be considered the most basic building block for larger compositions. It is my hope that "The Art of the Unaccompanied Song" workshop has enlivened the imagination and developed a more reliable ear in each of the 12 composers and 18 singers whose accomplishments the public may now sit back and enjoy.
