# **RESEARCH INTERESTS**

My research interests are broad, but unifying themes include adolescent development, social ecology, and prevention (or reduction) of risk behavior. For over a decade I have facilitated research on family-centered intervention. In this domain, I am particularly interested in adapting evidence-based intervention programs to ease implementation and increase program uptake in diverse contexts, settings, and populations.

A second area of interest is in understanding the characteristics of "good parenting" when it comes to young adult children. Although much is known about links between parenting behaviors in earlier stages of development and various social-emotional, academic, or behavioral outcomes, far less is known about the links between parenting behaviors and the well-being of young adult children. I am currently examining the relationship between parenting behavior during adolescence or early adulthood and young adult risk behavior.

A third area of interest is adolescent gender and sexual socialization, and their relationship to sexual behavior, sexual risk-taking, and emotional well-being in adolescence and adulthood. More specifically, I am interested in how young people integrate notions from a variety of sources (e.g., parents, peers, media) about what it means to be a sexual woman or man, and how these notions relate to both normative and risky sexual exploration/ behavior in adolescence and emerging adulthood. I am currently examining the distinction between normal, healthy sexual exploration and truly problematic behavior, as well as possible mechanisms by which Family Check-up intervention services reduce risky sexual behavior.
